Looking Ahead

SAIL CERTIFICATION

Our actual Class Rules specify that J/22 sail measurement control is event driven (see G.2.3 Measurement). As we are normally only doing sail measurement during major Championships, there is no proof that a sail which is used in a regatta is in line with the Class Rules.

In many other Classes, it is a rquirement that sails which are used in a one-design regatta are certified. Such a change has two benefits:

- Every sailor can eaily check that his competitor is using Class legal sails. This will secure the fairness in the regattas.
- The sail inspection during major Championships is faster, as there is normally no initial measurement for sails needed. Initial measurement means all dimensions of a sail need to be measured.

This change should not be put in place with immediate effect, but should be done well ahead e.g. in a two-year time period. This means all new sails are getting certified and the non-certified are dying out over time.

EQUIPMENT RULES OF SAILING (ERS) 2025-2028

The upcoming ERS 2025-2028 are coming up with a definition of maintenance. We should adapt our Class Rules to use that defintion as this change will align the definition of maintenance in our Class Rules for hull and hull apendages with the updated definition of maintenance in the ERS 2025-2028.

There is also a defintion of what repair means, but our current Class Rules are more strict for the definition. Therefore, we should not change to the definition provided in the ERS 2025-2028 for that.

None of the above topics is in any approval process yet. These are just some thoughts on what changes might be considered in the furture.

What a start to the 135th Travemuende Week! With sunshine and a beautiful easterly wind, the maximum number of three planned races could be completed on time.

The J/22s sailed their German Open on the sea course far out in the Bay of Lübeck. As expected, the German-French crew led by Reiner Brockerhoff (Duisburg), who has already celebrated many successes in Travemuende, came out on top. However, with the Berlin team led by skipper Wolf Jeschonnek, last year's World Championship runner-up at the same venue, they have a strong opponent who managed to snatch one victory from the Brockerhoff crew in three races and otherwise finished just behind the favorites.

The weather scenario on day two of Travemuende Week was not quite as perfect as at the start. The changing wind conditions offered tactical options, which Reiner Brockerhoff and his team were ultimately able to use to secure their storm to the top step of the podium.

An unexpected gust front with top speeds of up to 27 knots moved across the Bay of Lübeck on Monday afternoon and made life difficult for the participants. While the keelboats, including the J/22s, were able to cope with the conditions, the dinghies had to fight hard.

The winner of the J/22 German Open was Reiner Brockerhoff who, with his son Felix and the Frenchman Christoph Declerque in the bow, had an almost flawless winning streak. The Franco-German crew won seven of the eight races. "In the first race, we had to get used to it a bit, but after that, it went very well. We had very good speed, especially in the stronger winds today," reported skipper Brockerhoff.





He acknowledged that the second-placed team from Berlin, led by Wolf Jeschonnek, were strong opponents. Third place went to Thorsten Spötter and his team from Hamburg. However, several crews from the German fleet were missing from Travemuende.
